Welcome

Coleraine Grammar School has now been operational for seven years, building on the education provided previously by Coleraine Inst and Coleraine High School. We are developing a new vision for academically excellent coeducation in Coleraine in the 21st century, and we expect to have the school located on the Castlerock Road campus by September 2024.



Our core purpose is to provide a broad, varied and appropriate curriculum, supported by high quality teaching and learning and pastoral care. This is enhanced further by a wide range of extracurricular activities in music, sports, arts, drama and many other areas. Coleraine Grammar School Past, Present and Future:

Coleraine Grammar School is proud to trace its collective history, of some 300 years, from two renowned founding schools: Coleraine Academical Institution and Coleraine High School.

Coleraine Grammar School is operating for a limited time on two campuses, the Lodge Road and the Castlerock Road. Subsequently, the school plans to be located in expanded and enhanced facilities on a single campus on the Castlerock Road.

Coleraine High School, founded in 1874 by the Misses Long, was at the forefront of the movement to provide girls with a good education in the 19th Century. With its motto 'Virtute et Labore' ('by strength of character and diligence') setting the ethos, the school went on to enjoy a proud and successful history of over 140 years. In 1953, the school moved to a site at Spring Gardens on the Lodge Road and over the next two decades an extensive building programme followed. The school had a Boarding Department, which added an international dimension to the school, until 1997.

Each of the nine headmistresses brought their own style of leadership to the school and ensured its reputation grew in the local community and beyond. Academic excellence was at the core of the High

School together with a wide-ranging extra-curricular programme complementing the work in the classroom. The girls succeeded in a wide range of sports activities, public speaking competitions and impressed in the traditional music events such as the Carol Service, the Spring Concert and school musicals.

Coleraine Inst opened its doors in 1860, with two masters and fourteen boys. The school motto was three Greek words: 'Heos Hemera Estin' in English letters and translated, 'Work while it is day', which encouraged the boys in the school to seize the many opportunities available to them and to strive for success in all areas of their school life.

Coleraine Inst enjoyed continuity of leadership throughout its history as Dr David Carruthers was only the ninth Headmaster in the 150 years of the school's existence. In 1973 Dr George Humphreys was invited into membership of the Headmasters' Conference, and Coleraine Grammar School now continues to enjoy the distinction of being a HMC school.



After the boarding department closed in 1999, CAI facilities continued to thrive and expand, and during the past two decades the entire suite of science labs has been refurbished, a Technology Centre and a Home Economics Centre opened, the School Library totally reconstructed and three new computer suites installed. In addition to the full range of general and specialist classrooms, there is a Sixth Form Centre with a dedicated study area.

In September 2015, 'the second oldest girls' school in Northern Ireland' came together with Coleraine Academical Institution to form Coleraine Grammar School and the values, vision and ethos of both founding schools form the core of the new school.

Year 8 Transition

We aim to ensure that each pupil makes a smooth transition from primary school to Coleraine Grammar School and we are committed to supporting pupils throughout the process.

New pupils and parents will receive Year 8 Guidebooks which are tailored to specifically address any questions the new pupils might have about day to day school life in CGS; New pupils and parents are invited to an evening in June when Senior Management and members of the school pastoral team will address pupils and parents;

In July pupils are invited to Summer Camp and in August, new pupils start school a day sooner than the rest of the pupils in other year groups; In November there are pastoral parent/teacher interviews where the parents have the opportunity to speak to their child's form tutors. This will be followed by a meeting for parents with their child's subject teachers in the second term:

Throughout the school year, parents will receive information on their child's progress through three reports that are sent home.

Pupil centred pastoral care

The welfare of every pupil in Coleraine Grammar School is of paramount importance to us. We aspire to the provision of a high quality education where pupils are encouraged to develop a personal ethos of self-improvement in a safe, secure and supportive environment. Therefore, pastoral care permeates all aspects of our school. We aim to provide a caring environment where individuals are valued for their unique talents and abilities, both inside and outside the classroom. We strive to ensure that all our pupils achieve their potential in all areas of their school life.





In Coleraine Grammar School our pupils are:

- Our priority and as such are valued and respected;
- Treated equally and fairly;
- Encouraged and enabled to reach their full potential;
- Recognised as individuals and rewarded for their efforts and achievements;
- Prepared for life after school.

Every teacher in Coleraine Grammar School takes their pastoral duty of care very seriously. In a large grammar school where teachers change throughout the day, it is important that each pupil has someone they feel they know well and can be a first point of contact in school. The most fundamental link with our pupils is therefore, their Form Tutor, supported by the Pastoral Leader for Year 8.

Their role is:

- To meet with their form group on a daily basis;
- To support, mentor and encourage pupils;
- To monitor attendance and behaviour of pupils;
- To review the academic performance of pupils;
- To ensure the well-being of pupils.

The Form Tutor is supported by the Pastoral Leader for Year 8, the SENCo, the Pastoral Vice Principal and the school counsellor.

Solving conflict in CGS

Should any challenging behaviour arise in Coleraine Grammar School we aim to use a restorative approach, where building strong relationships means that learning is more effective. We aim to consider the harm caused by conflict and to encourage each individual to take responsibility for their part. It is hoped that in this way, the needs of those affected can be addressed and steps taken to put things right.



Supporting learners in Coleraine Grammar School

In Coleraine Grammar School we aim to provide additional support for those pupils who require it, to ensure they fulfil their potential. We have a Special Educational Needs team and dedicated Learning Support teachers who provide one-on-one and small group support for identified pupils across all year groups. Using these highly skilled and dedicated teachers we strive to meet the needs of all our pupils in the following ways:

- Engaging with parents and staff from the pupil's previous school:
- Securing, where needed, support from external agencies;
- · Developing and reviewing Individual Education Plans with input from parents, pupils and staff.

Key Stage 3 Curriculum

The learning journey in Coleraine Grammar School begins at Key Stage 3, with the aim of providing an innovative, varied and challenging curriculum designed to prepare our pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life. Coleraine Grammar School aspires to a tradition of academic excellence that both of its founding schools also upheld. It is recognised that the achievement of these aims is not exclusively the responsibility of the school. Coleraine Grammar School emphasises the need for close co-operation between teachers, Board of Governors, parents and other relevant bodies.

In CGS our pupils are also taught cross-curricular skills in Communication, Using Mathematics, Using ICT, Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities and these areas are integrated across the whole curriculum.

Key Stage 4 & Post-16 Curriculum

As the learning journey continues for our pupils, we aim to develop their learning further through a broad and exciting Key Stage 4 curriculum, whilst still maintaining the goal of academic excellence. The Entitlement Framework complements our curriculum by providing access to a wide range of relevant, high-quality examination courses for all pupils at Key Stage 4, with the addition of non-examination PE, Learning for Life and Work and Careers Education.

At Key Stage 4, pupils are given the opportunity to choose from a wide range of subjects and are prepared to take their place in society as responsible, caring and capable young adults.

At Key Stage 4 our pupils:

- Have access to an innovative, broad and balanced curriculum that can be tailored to their individual learning needs and interests;
- In addition to the subjects taken at Key Stage 3, there are various other subjects on offer for GCSE;
- Receive high quality care, guidance and support to enable them to make informed choices based on personal interests, talents, abilities and aptitudes;
- Can participate in a wide range of extra-curricular activities.



Sixth Form

In Coleraine Grammar School, we provide students with an innovative and flexible curriculum. Students can tailor their learning pathway to their individual needs and interests by choosing subjects from the array of courses we offer, thus achieving their academic potential. We are able to make full use of a wide range of courses on offer through our involvement in the Coleraine Area Learning Partnership. Through collaboration with this group, Coleraine Grammar



School can access further courses for senior pupils in co-operation with neighbouring schools.

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) is also an important and integral part of the curricular provision in Sixth Form and our pupils follow a structured programme of study. This is immensely useful to them when considering a life beyond school in their chosen career path.

Entry into Sixth Form is determined by overall GCSE performance together with high achievement in chosen AS options.

Each year we welcome many students into sixth from from other schools.



Coleraine Grammar School's Extra-Curricular Programme

In Coleraine Grammar School we offer an unrivalled variety of extra-curricular activities to our pupils across two campuses and using facilities in the local area. Whether pupils' interests are focused on sport or music, drama or outdoor pursuits, problem solving or performing, there is something for everyone.







Currently across the school's two sites, we have access to 8 rugby pitches, a 25 metre swimming pool, two 300 metre running tracks, a boathouse adjacent to the River Bann, 2 asphalt pitches, a large sports hall, 3 gyms, a

fitness suite, 6 tennis courts, 3 cricket wickets and 4 football pitches. In addition to these, pupils also use 2 astro turf hockey and football pitches at Rugby Avenue and state of the art fitness facilities at Coleraine Leisure Centre.
